This template can be used for multiple purposes:

 It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. 

Swimming Data

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Question	Stats:	Further context Relative to local challenges
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	25%	Due to high pupil turnover, a third of children (20) enrolled at New Hall from Year 4 onwards. As children learn to swim throughout the academic year when they are in Year 3, they would not have had opportunity to learn to swim after joining New Hall Primary. A number of children have also left New Hall since finishing their swimming lessons in Year 3. Some children in year 6 have been given the opportunity to complete swimming lessons during the Summer 1 half term.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	31%	

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	46%
